STANDARD RATING GOES TO TWENTY-TWO UNITS

TRAINING COMMITTEE LAUDS
TROOPS WHICH VIED FOR
'S' AWARD

Twenty-two troops are to be awarded standard rating for 1937, the Training Committee, headed by J. Wesley Cuningham, revealed today. Considering that there are 340 troops in Brooklyn, the committee pointed out, the 22 troops are to be complimented on achieving the "S".

The standard troops in Brooklyn will include: Atlantic District—Troops 53, 93, 105, and 248; Bath Beach District—Troop 249; Central District—Troops 2, 32, and 324; Eastern District—Troop 26; Flatbush Midwout—Troops 8, 34, 62, 122, 164, 186, 204, 232, and 286; Sheepshead Bay District—Troops 101 and 265, and Stuyford District—Troops 271 and 279.

To gain the standard rating the Troop had to have a registration of Scouts at the time of applying for charter renewal of more than 66-2/3 percent; recruiting during 1936 was to be at least 20 percent of the year's registration. One half of the recruits had to be 12 years of age; 25 percent of the Troop had to advance at least one rank during the year.

The Troop had to cooperate with the District and sponsoring institutions; the Troop had to be operated on a patrol basis and conduct an outdoor and camping program; books showing the Troop's affairs, had to be kept, and the Troophad to be uniformed, this depending upon the finances of the individual Scout.

Scoutmasters Are Urged To Send Names To Headquarters Prior to April 8; Applications Ready.

Jamboree activities are reaching the boiling point in Brooklyn. Scoutmasters and Scouts throughout the borough are speaking, eating, sleeping Jamboree.

In preparation of the gigantic event, to be staged in Washington, D. C., from June 30 to July 9, the Brooklyn Council Jamboree Committee, headed by Aldrich J. Sammis, will meet in Scout Headquarters on Thursday, April 8, at 7:30 P.M. to give Jamboree information to Scoutmasters and parents of Scouts who wish to attend the Jamboree.

All Scoutmasters who plan to send a member of their troop to the National Jamboree are urged to submit the name of the Scout or Scouts to Headquarters before the Jamboree Committee meets. Scoutmasters who are having contests in order to select a Scout to represent the troop will please notify Headquarters of this fact, so that a place may be reserved for their troop representative. Scouts who are interested in attending the National get-to-gether can secure applications by writing to Brooklyn Headquarters, 114 Remsen Street.

Additional information may be secured by telephoning Field Executive Philip F. Wagner at Triangle 5-1522.

Commissioner Alden P. Gleason has revealed a list of troops in the Flatbush Midwout District who have made tentative plans for sending a representative to the Jamboree. Troop 51, Commissioner Gleason said, plans to send four Scouts; Troop 62, one; Troop 24, one; Troop 260, one; Troop 8, two; Troop 34, one; Troop 232, two, and Troop 75, three.

1st—No shot guns, air rifles of any kind will be allowed in the woods.

2nd-No axes of any kind are allowed and are subject to confiscation.

3rd-No stone throwing.

Any violator is subject to arrest.

No doubt there are many Scoutmasters in Brooklyn like myself who appreciate the privilege of using Richmond woods for camping and do not know about these rules.

May I suggest that groups of Scouts going to Richmond woods should have some responsible leader with them if the Scoutmaster cannot go. I know that the Scouts do get blamed for a lot of things that hikers do when it is known that they have no leader with them, they do not have anything to say against troops or groups of Scouts who camp with a man leader.

I noticed a lot of damage done to trees in the woods and camp sites left very untidy, while I do not say it was Scouts, we get the blame for it.

Maybe you would like to pass this on to other Scoutleaders for their information, so that we may still have the pleasure of continued camping in Richmond

26 Troops In Competiton For Award—Winner Has Won Honor Two Previous Times

Outshining a field of twenty-six competitors Troop 178 of the Bushwick Arlington District walked off with top honors to win the Huntsman Trophy in the borough-wide Scouting exhibit, J. Wesley Cuningham, chairman of the Training Committee, announced today.

While Troop 178 won the trophy with an outstanding display, many of the exhibits were close contenders for first honors, the committee said, awarding honorable mention to the following: Troop 237 of Central; Troop 21 of Stuyford; Troop 241 of Eastern; Troop 109 of Bath Beach, and Troop 307 of Sunrise.

Troop 178, headed by Scoutmaster Howard Abeles and Assistant Scoutmaster Andrew Krumm, has won the title twice before.

Taking possession of store windows and theatre lobbies the troops put on their exhibit during the week of March 22. The winning troop chose the store windows of the Klafter Stove Works, 1401 Myrtle Ave., to set their stage.

Included in Troop 178's display were two knot boards, bottled snakes, 18 mounted leaves, two fern collections, in cotton, 12 twigs in plaster, two wood collections, model transmitter station, stones in plaster, marble collection, leaf-prints, polar scene, two Indian head-dresses, three model bridges, lamp shade, hair belt, Indian tepee, and a plaster cast of a human face.
