## 25,000 Scouts Cheer Roosevelt As He Inspects Jamboree Site

guestont thrill of the National Scout Jamboree was experienced by the 25,000 Scouts, representing every State in the country and from 25 foreign lands, when President Roosevelt drove through Constitution Ave. from the Capitol to the Washington Monument, between rows of khaki-clad Scouts lined up eight deep along both sides of the street last Friday. The nation's leading citizen was accompanied by officials and foreign diplomats and most of the members of his Cabinet.

#### 30-Minute Review

Prior to the review, preliminary plans called for a presidential stand, with the Scouts marching past in review. But, the President decided that the stationary parade would bring less descomfort to the Scouts in the hot sun. It took him less than 30 minutes to review the entire Jamboree contingents.

Twelve Scout bands, from different regions, played martial air and enlivened the proceedings.

#### Scouts Break Camp

As the Council Ring goes to press, the Jamboree Scouts are beginning to break camp and a thousand or more are making plans to attend the World Jamboree in Holland, next month. They will accompany 400 or more Scouts who came here from 25 foreign countries to attend the jamboree.

### Tips From The Tree Tops

By GEORGE E. HIX

a series of articles in the study of trees, The tree is easily distinguished by the prepared exclusively for the Council Ring lower branches which are often dead by George E. Hix, Scoutmaster of Troop and drooping. This member of the oak

Our discussion will continue with the study of the Oak family, the American Hornbeam and the Beech family.

AMERICAN HORNBEAM—Leaves oblong, pointed and sharply toothed. It is commonly known as a small shrub and grows about 10 to 25 feet high, with a peculiarly ridged trunk. close, smooth gray bark and the leaves are much like those of the Beech. The bark gives the appearance of muscles.

OAKS-These may be divided into three groups-WHITE OAK, RED OAK and CHESTNUT OAK.

The WHITE OAKS have leaves with rounded lobes. The best known is the AMERICAN WHITE OAK. The leaves have short stems, three to nine lobes, Gala Program and many remain upon the tree all Winter. The bark is light gray in color.

The second group has sharp-pointed lobed leaves and dark bark.

RED OAK-Leaves rather thin, moderately notched, sometimes very deeply. Bark-dark in tincture.

SCARLET OAK-Its leaves are deeply notched and the bark is a light shade of gray, although not deeply furrowed.

BLACK OAK-Leaves similar to that of the Scarlet Oak, but the bark of the trunk is thicker, rougher, and darker colored with the inner bark a light shade

> CHESTNUT OAK-Leaves long, not notched, coarsely toothed, with 10 to 16 pairs of prominent ribs beneath. Bark is rather dark and often deeply furrowed. Lack of space prevents describing the Oaks in greater detail. They are large and handsome trees.

> BEECHES-Easily identified by the smooth gray bark. The leaves are rather wide and distinctly toothed. The buds in Winter resemble rats. The EURO-PEAN BEECH is very similar to the American tree and is the one mostly seen in the city. There are several varieties.
