#### FREE FARM TRAINING COURSE OFFERED TO BOYS BETWEEN 16-20

Are you a boy between 16 and 20, in good health, able bodied and without work?

Are you tired of looking for a job in the city?

Would you like to take a Farm Training Course which will fit you for a farm job?

Three vital questions Miss Helen Baxter, director of the Farm Home Department of the Children's Aid Society is asking of boys today.

"Many boys feel the city offers greater advantages than the country," said Miss Baxter, "While the reverse is nearer the fact, particularly in these times. There is always employment at wages on a farm, always plenty of good food, and a wholesome living."

In the past five years 466 boys who took the Children's Aid Society's Farm Training Course were provided with paying jobs on farms in New York State.

The Society offers a free course in Gardening, General Farming, Care of Horses, Dairying, Poultry and Shop Work to boys who have a real interest in farming. At the minimum the course requires four months.

The farm to which the boy goes is Bowdin Farm at New Hamburg, N. Y., about ten miles south of Pough-keepsie. Here there are more than 300 acres on the Hudson River with adequate and well equipped barns and buildings. There are generally 40 or 50 boys in training.

Besides giving the free Training Course the Society finds a job for each boy who satisfactorily completes the course. There is an opportunity for the boy who shows special energy and ability to take short courses in farming at Cornell, Delhi, Farmindale and Cobleskill Agricultural Schools.

"If there are any country minded boys, who want help in planning a future on a farm I would be glad to see them at any time," said Miss Baxter, "however, preferably by appointment."
