
ANDERSON PORTRAYS HINDENBURG CRASH


Races 87 Miles To Assist Survivors Of Il-Fated Air-Liner

Too late to be of assistance, Anderson got within 30 feet of the smoldering hulk and then returned to Morristown.

"It was like a nightmare until I got close to the ruins," Anderson said. "And then it wasn't a nightmare any longer. The hard, grim faces of the Coast Guardsmen who ringed the ill-fated ship made it very real. I never saw a tougher bunch of men. They even told a group of naval officers to 'break it up and keep moving.'

Wreck Smolders

"We smelled burnt rubber a mile before we reached the smoldering craft. The wreck, still smoking and burning, lay in a darkened part of the field. The floodlights from the hangar did not reach

"I stood 30 feet from the aft end of the ship. The fabric was burned off and the framework sunk down as if the girders had melted. There was a ring of ground men and surf men from the Cape May Coast Guard station around the ship. A man stooped to pick up a small piece of wood, and was grabbed at once by two guardsmen who took the piece of wood from him and chased him off."
