and maintaining our buildings. There is a lot that can be done during the summer camp season. Email me at chairmantmrmuseum@gmail.com to learn more.


A Note from our 2025 Eastern Region Chief - Elijah Aiken



Arthur Eldred's Eagle Letter By Mitchell Slepian

Current Tampa resident **Stan Weinstein**, a longtime Brooklyn Scouter, Brooklyn Arrowhead Member, active Scouter in Theodore Roosevelt Council, Nassau County, and longtime member of the Jewish Committee on Scouting, sent the museum a copy of a letter sent by Chief Scout Executive James E. West to Arthur Eldred the first Eagle Scout of the BSA in 1912. The original is in the National Museum at Philmont Scout Ranch. The copy will be displayed this summer in the TMR Scout Museum. The copy of letter was donated to Weinstein by Eldred's sister. Thanks, Museum Founding Chair Dr. Eugene Berman, for coordinating with Weinstein.



A Picture Postcard History of Crystal Lake By David M. Malatzky

The Museum has an extensive collection of post cards covering TMR before its purchase by the N.Y.C. Boy Scouts starting in 1927. These are often the only known images of buildings and scenes from this era.



Postcard publishers were authorized to issue cards with Postcards starting in 1901. Before 1907, the entire back of the postcard was reserved for mailing and return addresses. The front often had space for the sender's comments. Starting in 1907, the back was divided into message and address sections, with a full photo or illustration on the front. In the early 1900s, picture postcards cost one cent each to mail and were wildly popular with the public. Postcards were issued for many notable buildings and scenes throughout the U.S.

Crystal Lake House, New York Post Card (Auburn Greeting Card Co.)

The "Van Allen Residence" or "Big House" was constructed from 1893-1900 near today's Camp Keowa COPE Course. Its capacity was 100 persons, and nearly every room had hot and cold running water and gas for lighting. It stood in Camp Keowa until the early 1960s.

In 1916, Otto Grassmann, part owner of the Half Moon Lake House, purchased the 4,000-acre Van Allen Grange from George Van Allen for \$30,800. In 1917, the Van Allen Residence reopened as a boarding house called the Crystal Lake House with the remainder of the property used as a hunting preserve.

Origin Story of TMR By David M. Malatzky

The NYC Scouts acquired TMR by negotiating options to buy land from local owners, who were unaware of the NYC interest. In 1927, thirty-two landowners signed deeds in Monticello, at least as reported by historian James Burbank in 1952. However, recent research tells us that the Scouts actually gained ownership of 9,776 acres on October 8, 1927, through twenty-three deeds involving diverse landowners from locations as far as Chicago and Philadelphia.

These deeds were signed between September 26 and October 7, 1927, and were certified by a Notary Public. Milton U. Gaul, of Gaul & Kampfer, completed

the transfer to the Boy Scout Foundation of Greater New York, with all documents recorded on October 8, 1927. For the original TMR deeds, visit the <u>Museum's website</u>.

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TMR Trail Tools Available at Headquarters Camp By David Malatzky

The Friends of TMR have installed an aluminum cabinet at Headquarters Camp filled with tools for units doing trail work at TMR. The cabinet is adjacent to the Weekend Office/Trading Post down the hill from the TMR Scout Museum. Tools include crosscut saws, large loopers, bow saws, hammers, axes, and safety goggles to outfit a large unit doing trail work. The cabinet is unlocked. Units borrowing tools should fill out the sign-out book in the cabinet. Weekend Units are encouraged to do trail work at TMR.
